Course Description: Sociology is the systematic, scientific study of the patterns and processes of social life, touching on all of its major dimensions – economic, political, religious, familial, and criminal, to name a few. It studies both individual actors, and the informal groups and formal organizations that populate the social landscape. In this course, we will examine the major questions that guide sociological analysis. We will explore some of the big questions we face as social beings, and talk about some of the intriguing answers – and questions, for that matter – that sociologists have provided. Specific areas to be covered include: culture, socialization and social interaction, social groups, deviance, social class, race and ethnicity, sex and gender, and aging. Students in the class will also choose other topics to cover from the following list: family, economics, politics, education, religion, medicine, global stratification, or population and urbanization. We will also practice “doing” sociology by exploring our everyday social worlds and the oftentimes invisible or taken-for-granted social forces that shape it.

Course Learning Outcomes:

- 1.) Students will be able to understand the sociological perspective and use it to analyze contemporary social problems in the United States.
- 2.) Students will be able to apply sociological theories to contemporary social problems as a way to understand various social problems and their causes.
- 3.) Students will be able to exercise their sociological imagination in order to reflect upon questions of personal and social responsibility in a complex and ever changing society.

Grading Calculation: Quarter grades will be 80% of the semester final grade and the final project/paper will be the remaining 20%. Please be aware that there is no final exam per se, but a reaction paper will be submitted in lieu.

Required Materials:

- ✓ A binder for class notes, handouts, etc.
- ✓ Spiral notebook or loose leaf paper for notes
- ✓ 2- Highlighters of different colors (e.g. one pink and one blue)
- ✓ 1- Book cover-- This cover can be the kind you buy at the store (check Wal-Mart), something you make yourself out of heavy paper, or anything in between, but the text must be covered and remain covered throughout the semester. A quick note: If you are buying a cover from Wal-Mart, Walgreens, etc. make sure that you buy the "jumbo" size as they are the only ones that will fit textbooks this large.
- ✓ Page Flags
- ✓ Earphones/earbuds and Chromebook when requested
- ✓ Pen/Pencil

Absences: It is the student's responsibility to see the classroom teacher on the **FIRST** day back to school to make arrangements for any missed material and/or makeup work. Students will be given a "day for a day" when absent, so in other words if you miss one day you have one day to do the work and turn it in.

- ✓ If a student is going to be out of class due to a pre-arranged absence (e.g. a track meet, field trip, doctor's appointment, etc.), and there is homework due, it is the student's responsibility to get that homework in **BEFORE** leaving school. These types of absences are typically known about many days in advance, so it is up to the student to attend to their academic responsibilities before the absences occur. Simply being out of class is not an excuse for not turning things in on their due dates. In other words, if a student is in the building at any time on the day something is due, they are expected to turn the assignment in. All work submitted late after such an absence will be considered late and graded accordingly.
 - I realize that you have other classes and obligations, and I am willing to be flexible; however, please be aware that it is crucial to keep the lines of communication open, so please let me know of things as far ahead as you can.
- ✓ Missing assignments due to unexcused absences will be assigned a grade of zero.

Grading: All points given in this class are added together and divided by the total number given. Letter grades are determined by the following scale:

Classroom Code of Conduct:

- ✓ All students are expected to maintain respect at all times for themselves, fellow students, as well as all faculty members. - ✓ ***The use of iPods, cell phones, Chromebooks, or any electronic/noise-making devices is prohibited unless otherwise approved. Use, not requested or approved by the instructor, will result in disciplinary action. You will get ONE warning to put your device away, after that it will be confiscated and taken to the office.***
- ✓ All work that you submit for this course should be your own. Plagiarism (submitting someone else's work or thoughts as your own) and other forms of cheating will be dealt with severely. If you are having problems with an assignment, please come see me BEFORE resorting to the short-sighted practice of cheating. I am here to help you learn and to help you develop the skills necessary to succeed. Because cheating and plagiarism are strict violations within all realms of academia, it will result in the following consequences: a failing grade on the assignment as well as a phone call home, which will be made by the student.
- ✓ Being prepared for class means having the textbook, any assigned homework, notes, pen/pencil, etc. when you enter the classroom. Students should be ready to begin class when the bell rings, and as a result, they will not be permitted to go to their locker, the bathroom, or anywhere else once class has started. PLEASE USE THE RESTROOM AND STOP AT YOUR LOCKERS BEFORE CLASS STARTS.

Homework and Late Work Policy:

- ✓ All assignments and classroom business will be posted on our Canvas Classroom page. If you missed class, need access to your online text, forgot a handout at school, don't remember the homework, forget when something is due, etc. all of it can be found on our Canvas page. Check it as often as you can!
- ✓ Assignments are expected to be turned in ON TIME, which is at the start of class. If it is not submitted on time, it is late- regardless of whether it is 30 seconds or 30 minutes. "I need to run to my locker" or "It's in my car" are not valid excuses, and if students retrieve it and bring it in at a later time, it is still late.
- ✓ In the event that you miss a quiz, you have 72 hours to make it up. Once that time frame has elapsed, you will no longer be able to make it up.
- ✓ Opportunities for extra credit may be given to students who have completed all of their assignments, but remember– I DO NOT GIVE GRADES, STUDENTS EARN GRADES. Extra credit may not be enough to save a student at the end of the semester.
- ✓ If a student is coded as "unexcused" through the Attendance Office, late work will not be accepted for points, missed assessments be administered, and grades will be assigned as zeroes.
- ✓ Late work that is submitted simply because it is incomplete or not done will be accepted ONLY within 24 hours of the original due date. ***ANY LATE WORK SUBMITTED MUST HAVE A LATE FORM ATTACHED OR IT WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.***
 - These assignments will be accepted, but they will only be worth half credit.
 - Once 24 hours have passed since the due date, late work will not be accepted for points. I will gladly take a look at it and correct it, but points will not be given for the assignment.

Tips for Success:

- ✓ Come to class prepared.
- ✓ Make sure to bring all necessary materials to class each day.
- ✓ Participate in our daily discussions.
 - We will create a vibrant learning environment, so it is important that everyone has the space and opportunity to voice their ideas and analyses. If you are talking while another person is speaking (be that classmate, myself, guest speaker, or anyone else) I will address that violation immediately. Additionally, I do not expect you to be Snap Chatting, texting, Tweeting, or working on other things while I am teaching or at any point during our class.
 - We will discuss controversial matters this semester. You may, and are certainly encouraged to, disagree with other students, your texts/readings/supplemental materials, and even myself. When you do disagree, I ask that you do so in a respectful and open minded fashion. This does not mean that you have to employ “political correctness” in speech per se, but it does mean that all points of view must be expressed with the due respect for the differing perspectives of others. It goes without saying that name calling is completely unacceptable at all times. In the event that someone disagrees with you, your ideas, analyses, etc., please do not take it personally as we are all coming from different starting places and vantage points in life. Please have our entire learning community in mind when you make an argument in class.
 - Sometimes you or your classmates may be reluctant to start a controversial discussion, but I encourage you to be the brave person who starts the dialogue, as that is what the world needs more of- brevity, honesty, and open dialogue.
- ✓ The number of assignments will fluctuate in this class, so be sure to do those that we have and submit them on time. Failure to do so may have a devastating impact on your grade.
- ✓ Don't be afraid to ask for help! I genuinely want each of you to do well and succeed- both in my class and in life as a whole. However, there are times when you may need to ask for help. I encourage you to ask without hesitation or anxiety, as all issues and questions will be addressed and hopefully resolved promptly.
- ✓ Finally, make sure to think and question in this class.
